Merci, Texas:

A Story of Generosity and Gratitude

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the Merci Train on American soil. After World War II, Americans generously sent millions of dollars in food and other supplies for the citizens of Western Europe. In gratitude, the people of France sent more than 52,000 gifts inside railroad boxcars that became known as the Merci Train. The 49 railcars arrived on the freighter Magellan in New York Harbor in February 1949. One boxcar was given to each of the 48 states at that time with the 49th car shared by the people of the District of Columbia and the Hawaiian territory.


A version of this display was first shown at the Capitol Visitors Center in 2017. Thousands of visitors had the opportunity to learn about the Merci Train and the priceless treasures that were sent to Texas. This special commemorative exhibition includes original artifacts from the train like artwork, toys, medals and other objects. Opening day festivities in 2017 included the chance to see the restored Texas boxcar outside the Visitors Center on 12th and Brazos Streets.
